At Yealmpton Primary we use **The Sentence Toolkit**. This is a visual way to help children remember what each device for writing is used for.

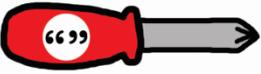
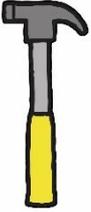
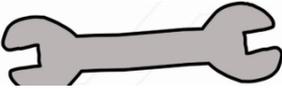


You may have seen these tools on display in the classroom, in your child's book or even as part of their homework.
